Winston Robinson attended this week's Board of Education meeting.

The Board of Education will be submitting their approved budgets to county government sometime this week.

County Executive Tari Moore said she will wait to comment specifically on the school's requested budget.

"CCPS (Cecil County Public Schools) hasn't presented their adopted budget to us yet, so I don't know the details," Moore said earlier this week.

"We've had numerous meetings with CCPS leadership over the past few months to discuss budget issues," Moore said. "As elected officials who serve the same people as I do, the Board of Education deserves the opportunity to present the details of their proposed budget to the County without prejudice or prior comment."

"We are going to have to do the best that we can to fund public education," said Cecil County Council President Robert Hodge.

He said that citizens need to understand "we don't have an endless pot of money."

Hodge said it is also important to note that the Council and county administration have stressed their commitment to not raise taxes.

Asked how county government will deal with Governor Hogan's proposed cuts to Cecil County for public schools, Cecil College and other state funding, Hodge said, "Right now there are many efforts to modify the Governor's budget."

"My best guess is the Governor will modify the budget," Hodge said.

Pointing to the state's cutting of highway funding to counties and towns during the past few years, Hodge said the county is accustomed to coping with state funding issues.

"It's nothing new - we have been dealing with it," Hodge said.

Hodge said the county government had been hoping to be able to cut the property tax rate for this fiscal year, but he believes the county will just have to work to hold the line on the tax rate.

owners and staff as the restaurant undergoes an amazing transformation.

That means pharmacist Marybeth Sniadowski-Cole, her family and staff will be at the epicenter of the show's action.

There have been more than 130 episodes of "Restaurant Impossible" since the show started in 2011.

The production company certainly does not realize this, but that number - more than 130 - matches the number of years the building has been used as a drug store.

The year was 1875 when 107 East Main Street in Elkton opened its doors as a pharmacy.

The Sniadowski family has owned the business for many of those years.

Sniadowski-Cole's father, the late Anthony J. Sniadowski, joyfully celebrated his 50th year in business in downtown Elkton in 2011.

During an exclusive interview with the "Cecil Guardian" for Lyon's 50th year, Sniadowski recalled how he worked with former pharmacy owner George Schmidt for several years prior to purchasing the business.

"He taught me a lot," Sniadowski said. "Then I thought, 'okay, let's give it a shot.'"

Sniadowski moved his family up to Elkton from Baltimore - and the rest is downtown Elkton history.

At the time Sniadowski purchased the pharmacy, there was an old-time soda fountain in the store with seven stools.

He later remodeled the business - adding booths and tables to accommodate up to 40 diners.

With the courthouse, government buildings, newly-weds and other people in Elkton for business, the luncheonette became a gathering place for a cross-section of Elkton residents and visitors.

Sniadowski remained a fixture in the pharmacy and luncheonette up until he passed away in June, 2013. The family still operates the business.

This televised revitalization of the business will be the first major renovation of the building in more than 30 years.

While Lyon's Pharmacy will be the recipient of a lot of attention on a popular national show, the "Restaurant Impossible" coverage will be a boon to the entire downtown Elkton area and beyond.

"I think this is a great opportunity for the locals to come to downtown Elkton and see the excitement of the filming of a nationally televised show and also take a walk downtown and see the new businesses," said Main Street Manager and Town Council Member Mary Jo Jablonski. "I'm very excited for the Sniadowski-Cole family and can't wait to see the renovations."

As the visit from "Restaurant Impossible," draws near, there is an atmosphere of excitement in Lyon's Pharmacy.

But do not bother to try to ask them any questions.

Sniadowski-Cole and her husband, Ed Cole, will not answer any queries - neither confirming nor denying what is about to happen - just smiling now that the show's producers have let the proverbial cat out of the bag.

The "Restaurant Impossible" producer confirmed that all associated with Lyon's Pharmacy are bound by contract to be silent about any details of the show.

Even after the Lyon's Pharmacy renovation episode is aired, the shop owners still have to remain silent for five additional days.

There is no set date for the Lyon's Pharmacy episode to air on The Food Network, but it is rumored that it will be shown in late April.

officials have been quite adamant during this budget season that Cecil County schools can no longer have flat budgets. They pointed to lay-offs during the past several years, loss of money for student materials and programs and deferred maintenance for school buildings.

Branch quoted from the county's approved strategic plan and its commitment to the importance of education as the reason the county needs to make education more of a priority.

The Board of Education approved a construction budget of \$19,108,501 for FY16. The county would fund \$13,763,051. For the current fiscal year, the county funded approximately \$11 million for school construction.

As for debt service, the county will need to fund \$8,663,953 for FY16.

Construction projects prioritized for the next few years include the replacement of both Gilpin Manor Elementary School and Chesapeake City Elementary School. Both are in the planning stages.
