"This was a memorable event and we hope we will have the opportunity again in the coming years," Sparks said.

One local company, A & M Tent Events, provided their services to the Bassmaster Elite Tournament.

"A & M Tent Events was proud to be a part of the Bassmaster Elite event," said Faith Addair. "We are blessed to be part of all the large county events requiring tents, tables and chairs and we were excited to add the Bassmaster to

our event list."

"While this was the first year, but hopefully not the last for Cecil County hosting this event, we have heard very good feedback from attendees," Addair said. "This type of event is just what the county needs to bring in more revenue while attracting more year-round tourism. I think that the benefits of this event will be felt for months to come."

"My husband and I took time to visit a restaurant and store that we have not been to before this weekend," Addair added.

There was a wagon that traveled between the North East Community Park and the

downtown area of the town. County officials said they have heard some complaints from downtown North East business owners who expected more business from the tournament.

County Executive Tari Moore, who was at the Bassmaster Elite on both Saturday and Sunday, said there will be meetings to discuss the tournament and to look at ways to improve such events and to engage more local businesses.

Cecil County Council members said they, too, will review the tournament. The majority of the Council attended the event and found it to be a well-organized.

Both Moore and Council members praised Turner, Economic Development Office staff and the many volunteers for creating a well-organized, nationally televised event.

Council President Robert Hodge said as the tournament is broadcast and re-broadcast on ESPN2, the county will receive additional national exposure, leading to more people wanting to come to Cecil County.

As for what businesses can do to cash-in on future events, the owner of Steak on Main said it is up to the business owners to find ways to lure customers into their restaurants and shops.

will be many discussions with stakeholder groups in the future, as well," the County Exec said, explaining that since this was Cecil County's first Bassmaster Elite event, county officials plan to dig deeply to analyze the event, the numbers and the impact.

"Although there is only preliminary data available at this point, three main themes rose to the top of our debrief," Moore said. "First, the Bassmaster event in the park was hugely successful, thanks to excellent planning and execution from Sandy her team, and great help from hundreds of volunteers."

"The second theme was that North East merchants did not see the anticipated business expected from the estimated attendance numbers we were given to plan the event - that dynamic needs to change in future events," Moore said.

"The third main theme was recognition of the positive economic impact that has occurred since the day it was announced Cecil County had been chosen as a venue - and how we capture that data in the future," she said.

"My husband and I attended the event both Saturday and

Sunday and we're still amazed by the experience," Moore said. "I spoke with dozens of attendees, BASS officials and staff, anglers, vendors and sponsors - all of whom spoke highly of our community and their desire to come back."

"The Bass folks are top-notch, and I was impressed with their concern for the environment and their care and release system for the fish," Moore said. "And my heart was touched by the dozens of stories I heard of the good will and hospitality shared by the people of Cecil County."
