- 2) Thirty days after the personal representative mails, or otherwise delivers, to the creditor a copy of this published notice or other written notice, notifying the creditor that the claims will be barred unless the creditor presents the claim within thirty days from the mailing or other delivery of the notice.

Any claim not served or filed within that time, or any extension provided by law, is unenforceable thereafter.

# Cecil College Welcomes Advocate, Engineer And Survivor Feb. 25



Cecil College's Multicultural Student Union presents "Speaking Truth: Overcoming Challenges to Succeed as a Professional – Athlete or Academic," a presentation by William Tipper Thomas III at 3 p.m. Feb. 25, in Room 106 of the Technology Center on the college's North East campus.

On May 7, 2004, Thomas was an innocent bystander in a shooting incident at Randallstown High School, in Randallstown, Maryland, that left the onetime three-sport athlete paralyzed. Despite not being able to fulfill a lifelong dream of playing collegiate football, he graduated from Morgan State University in 2011 with a Bachelor of Science degree in electrical engineering. He is currently employed at Northrop Grumman Corporation as a systems engineer and is working on his master's degree in technical management at Johns Hopkins University.

An active mentor and community service leader, Thomas believes in speaking out on urban community health issues, including domestic violence, mental health and race relations. He also speaks against youth violence and promotes science, technology, engineering and math education. An advocate for people who live with disabilities regarding public policy, diversity and inclusion, he has been featured on panels with professional athletes and other celebrities.

Thomas' personal mission is to tell his story with hopes of motivating people of all ages, races and backgrounds. In 2009, he founded the T.I.P.P.E.R Foundation, an acronym for Traumatic Inpatient Parent Provider Emergency Reserve. The purpose of the foundation is to assist families experiencing a loss of wages due to needing to be with their children or direct relatives recovering from injuries suffered by traumatic events.

"There are times in life when it seems hard to actually affirm that you can make it, that you can actually overcome those obstacles and attain that new height," said Thomas. "However, if you decide that you want it, nothing will stop you from doing it – regardless of physical ability, level of education, or environmental circumstances."

Thomas has made many presentations and has received several honors, including the We Are The Dream Award from the Baltimore City Youth Commission in 2015 and the Community Service Leadership Award from Northrop Grumman Corporation in 2014.

and even white beans. Another chili featured deer meat. Others used pulled beef instead of ground beef.

Bowlsbey went with a traditional chili. She started with four pounds of beef and added red and green peppers, cayenne, tomatoes and other chili staples.

She said it was no surprise that people said her chili tasted like what their mom used to make for them.

But she does have a special addition for the chili. Her secret ingredient is to add a bit of cocoa.

"It takes the acidity away," Bowlsbey explained.

"It's just an old fashioned chili - that's all it was," Bowlsbey said.

Chefs, just like all artists, must sometimes suffer for their creations.

Her entry into the competition did not happen without some drama.

"I made two crock pots full of chili," Bowlsbey said. "I spilled half of a crock pot in the back of my new car!"
