Remembering Bobby *Continued from page 1*

Trade Center is shown repeatedly.

"It never goes away and it makes it harder because it's so public," Mrs. Fangman said.

While she has participated in a number of events and interviews through the years, Mrs. Fangman has preferred to keep a more quiet profile.

This 15th anniversary is a milestone and she welcomed an interview, and met with the Cecil Guardian, along with her son, Steve Fangman, who works at Premier Auto in Elkton.

"There's just something different about the 15th year," he said.

Mrs. Fangman's Delaware home has evolved into a tribute to her lost son.

In the aftermath of the terrorist attack, there were many tributes that included items to honor those murdered that fateful day in 2001.

At the top of her stairs, a quilt made of uniforms is a focal point for the living room. There are photos and many items handcrafted by school children and many other individuals and groups. One man took pieces of the twisted steel from the World Trade Center towers and fashioned heavy crosses, mailing them to each and every family that lost a loved one.

Then there are the ashes, the identified remains of Robert John "Bobby" Fangman. They are in a wine bottle kept in a glass-front cabinet. Mrs. Fangman said they did not know if they would ever find a trace of him, but they had two services - one for each time some of her son's remains were discovered and identified.

Mrs. Fangman went back to that day that would forever change her family's lives.

"Believe it or not, I was taking my next door neighbor to the airport," Mrs. Fangman recalled. She had heard that a plane had crashed into the World Trade Center and thought, as everyone did, that it was a horrible accident. She was able to drop her neighbor off at the Philadelphia Airport without any problem.

"On my way back, an announcement came over the radio that another airline had crashed into the North Tower," she said. She did not yet know that her youngest child was on that plane.

Mrs. Fangman continued home, only to have to return to the airport to try to get her neighbor since all air travel was suspended.

She was worried, but still could not imagine that her son was a victim in the attacks.

All of the family became concerned because they could not contact Bobby. They did not initially panic because they did not think Bobby was working, Mrs. Fangman said.

"He wasn't supposed to be on that flight," Steve said.

"We called his cell phone and then called his apartment and talked to his roommate," Mrs. Fangman said.

They discovered he had been called into work, but still had hope. Only employed by the airline for eight months, Bobby was still only scheduled for short flights.

When they got the word he was on the second plane to hit the World Trade Center, grief enveloped the family.

Then they wanted to know how and why their loved one was on one of those planes.

Twist Of Fate

Mrs. Fangman said the questions about Bobby's reason for being on a plane going beyond his usual flight schedule were answered by another flight attendant.

The CNN network called to tell them a woman wanted to talk to them. Mrs. Fangman said CNN and most news outlets were very compassionate and did not push families to participate in any news story. It was up to the families to decide.

This other flight attendant was supposed to be working on the second plane that hit the World Trade Center. She told Mrs. Fangman she tried to schedule herself on this flight, but the computer kept rejecting her attempts.

She was then scheduled to work on another flight.

On the bus ride from the parking area to the terminal to report for work on September 11, this woman actually sat with Bobby Fangman.

"She told him, 'I was supposed to get that flight,' that she had been unable to schedule herself for that flight," Mrs. Fangman said.

In fact, family members of the woman thought she was on the plane that crashed into the World Trade Center.

"Her husband didn't know for four hours that she wasn't on that plane," Mrs. Fangman said.

The woman told her that Bobby was excited to finally be able to work a flight headed across the country. He told the woman the things he was planning to do when he got to California, including going to a special bar he had heard about and wanted to visit.

"She actually remembered all that he said and did," Steve Fangman said.

After fate kept her off the plane, the woman left the aviation industry and went on to become a nurse, Mrs. Fangman said, adding that the woman also felt compelled to visit the places Bobby told her he wanted to go during their bus ride conversation on that fateful day.

The family was happy to find out what Bobby was talking about as he went to the plane on his last day. But they still wonder what happened on that plane and Bobby's actions during the terrorist attack.

Prior to 9/11, when a plane was hijacked, the hijackers would demand the plane be flown to a specific airport and demands would have been made.

"The first thought he probably would have had was, 'what country are we going to,'" Steve Fangman said.

"They (flight attendants) were told to do what the hijackers wanted," Mrs. Fangman said.

Given his lack of seniority, Bobby would have been assigned to the back of the airplane, away from the violence at the front of the plane where hijackers took over the cockpit.

The family assumes that a call from the airplane to airline headquarters to report the hijacking was probably made by Bobby from a phone located at the rear of the plane.

Even after all these years, no one has played the tape for them or confirmed it was their loved one who reported the plane had been hijacked.

About Bobby

"He was a free spirit," Steve Fangman said about his brother.

Bobby was the youngest of seven children, breaking a three-to-three boy-girl tie in the family. There is a 20-year spread between the oldest and youngest in the Fangman clan.

"He was a perfect example of dancing like nobody's watching," Steve Fangman said.

Mrs. Fangman said he was a bit of a whiner as a young child - and a very picky-eater.

His older siblings also started a rumor to tease him and, for awhile, Bobby thought it might actually been true.

"He thought we were

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
